Puppy Mills

Ever since Oprah Winfrey covered puppy mills earlier this year, the issue has exploded in the American media. The Humane Society of the United States and the ASPCA have active campaigns against the horrors of puppy mills. Still, the average person isn't aware of what the problem is and how to combat it. What exactly is a puppy mill? Simply put, a puppy mill or kennel is a breeding operation that does not conform to humane standards. Dogs, allegedly of pure breed, are often kept in unsanitary environments with a lack of exercise, food and water—let alone the human attention and affection that dogs need to develop and thrive. Female dogs are often forced through multiple litters each year in these squalid conditions. In many cases the puppies suffer through the same. Frequently kept in cages with only mesh flooring and water bowls coated in green slime, rescued puppy-mill dogs are often covered in feces and urine; many struggle with serious disease. Often, puppy-mill dogs are only cleaned up when sold to pet stores or when they are to be shown to unsuspecting buyers looking for a "pedigree puppy."

What can you do to stop the puppy mill crisis? Puppy mills are operated solely for profit. They are easy money because of the substandard care given to the animals. When the operations are no longer easy money, puppy mills will no longer exist. If you are looking for a dog, or a puppy, check your local shelter first. In a nation that prides itself as a melting pot, aren't mutts the most American of dogs? If you have your heart set on a purebred dog—*check shelters first*; it is estimated that over 25% of the dogs turned into shelters are purebreds. Check local, breed-specific rescue groups. If that doesn't work, do your homework and be sure you are buying from a reputable breeder. Your veterinarian can be a good resource.

How do you tell a reputable breeder from a puppy mill operator? Reputable breeders usually only raise one breed of dog. Why? Because they are not solely motivated by profit; they may be enamored by the apple-shaped head of chihuahuas or the splayed front feet of basset hounds. They carefully select the dogs they breed because they are committed to bettering the breed; they want to avoid any breed-specific health problems and to attain a dog as close to the AKC standard as possible. Most reputable breeders do not advertise in the newspaper. Especially avoid any "puppies ready for Christmas" ads. Puppies from reputable

THE "NO KILL" SHELTER DEBATE*A message from our shelter's Executive Director Mark Plyter*

We have received calls and had inquiries from people in Wayne County and many surrounding counties stating that they would like to bring in their cat or dog because they heard we are a "no kill" shelter. While it is true that we have not had to euthanize an animal in nearly 3 years for space, we do euthanize animals that are considered unadoptable (aggressive, ill, or suffering).

Because of on-going and highly visible debates about the words we use to define ourselves, we tend to create a perception in our communities that may not be correct. Open admission shelters admit all animals, every day, no matter what. "No kill" shelters will house sick or aggressive animals until they pass away, sometimes spending thousands of dollars on their care, leaving no room for healthy adoptable animals. Many open admission shelters have to euthanize healthy and behaviorally sound animals because of overcrowding. While many believe that "no kill" can be misleading to the public, most also believe that, at its heart, it reflects a goal of everyone in the sheltering field—to end the need for euthanasia of healthy and behaviorally sound animals.

I like to "define" what we are as limited admission. When the shelter is full, we ask people looking to relinquish their animals to schedule a time to bring them in. This allows us to be able to adopt out animals and make more room for the incoming animals.

Why do we have to struggle with these issues every day? It is not the animal control agencies nor the shelter—we have stood on the frontline of this battle for decades. It is the communities themselves that continue to generate more animals than responsible homes. No one ever thought to blame the American Cancer Society for cancer yet some members of the public and media continue to blame animal homelessness and euthanasia on shelters.

While we are doing the best we can here and trying to find the best options for the animals we are entrusted with, it is up to all of us to educate the public. Together we can capture the common goal of everyone that deals with cat and dog overpopulation—placing the adoptable into quality homes and limiting the number of unwanted births.

breeders are usually spoken for well in advance of their birth. Many breeders have extensive application procedures and background checks and will also take the pet back in case of serious issues; reputable breeders do not want their puppies going to just anyone. It's for that reason that *most reputable breeders do not supply pet stores.*

Owning a pet is a serious responsibility and so is choosing a breeder. If you aren't sure about the breeder, before you look into your new puppy's eyes and fall in love, ask to tour the kennels where the dogs are kept. Insist on seeing the puppy's parents. If the breeder refuses, walk away—you have likely stumbled into a puppy mill operation.

Sadly, even though in the U.S. Alone, animal shelters euthanize three to four million dogs and cats a year, applications for kennel licenses are on the rise; puppy mills are a high-profit industry. It is not a crime to breed dogs, or cats for that matter, for profit. Everyone understands that businesses must make a profit. It is a fact of life that domestic animals are commodities to be sold and dealt—and for some that is all they are. Legislation cannot obligate breeders to treat dogs and cats with the love and affection that most dog and cat owners would. *However*, legislators must hear our voices insisting that these companion animals be treated *humanely*. As pet lovers we have the responsibility of being advocates for our four-legged friends.

Here in Western New York, several organizations are working diligently to bring awareness—and solutions—to the scourge of puppy mills. Puppy Mill Rescue (puppymillrescue.com) is a hardworking local group dedicated to saving dogs from the ravages of puppy mills. They sponsor the “Bark Heard Round the World” event in order to promote the needed changes. This summer, the “Bark” was heard just outside of Penn Yan in Yates County. The event brought together many different animal organizations including breed rescue groups and “Rescue Ink”. The men from “Rescue Ink” are a group of tattooed tough-guys with hearts of gold—they spend their days promoting animal welfare and protecting those furry friends who need them. Check rescueink.org for more information.

Lastly, dogs from puppy mills are likely to have serious health and behavior issues. Dogs that suffer through those problems many times end up at local animal shelters, like the Humane Society of Wayne County. But just like people, a little love can go a long way and these abandoned “puppy mill” pets can still give back all the warmth and love that their new owner gives them. Thousands of success stories are out there, and only by talking about the issues, the solutions, and by having the courage and love to give a home to these animals can change happen. Educate others about puppy mills in order to drive change, and as always, consider adopting from your local animal shelter first. You won't be sorry.
