We thought it might be fun to check in on what some former foster kitties are up to.



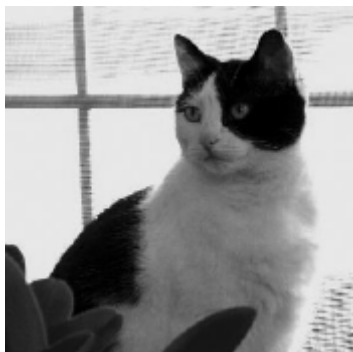
Ringo sends birthday wishes to his siblings!

INNOCENT VICTIMS OF THE FINANCIAL CRISIS: PETS

Camble, a golden retriever mix, knows nothing of Fannie Mae or credit-default swaps, and he has never expressed any discernable opinion on government bailout plans. But Camble has been affected by the nation's and Wayne County's current economic turmoil. He recently came into the Shelter not only because his owner had to move and could not take him to the new rental property, but purchasing food for him had become increasingly difficult.

As the economy descends into recession and unemployment rates rise, many people are deciding that they can no longer afford to care for their animals. Many others are forced to relinquish beloved family pets because of a change in residence.

Camble's story has a happy ending; he was adopted quickly into a loving home. However, the calls into our Shelter and shelters nationwide continue to come in at an alarming rate. As of March 15th this year, we have admitted 39% more dogs and cats than we did during the same time period in 2008. If this trend continues through 2009, our Shelter will receive over 1,700 dogs and cats this year. In our history, we have never had that many animals surrendered.

We are actively looking into a couple of new programs that will assist Wayne County residents with keeping their pets at home. Please stay tuned for updates as we move forward with these programs. Not only do we have to help the public, but our expenses will significantly increase with such a dramatic rise in possible admissions. We need your help; tell your family, friends, and neighbors that we are looking for good homes for good dogs and cats. We are also in need of financial assistance to provide for the animals we are entrusted with. The animals are, again, innocent victims of our irresponsible actions and inactions.

**What You Should Know About Dog Bite Prevention:**

Any dog can bite—even the cuddliest, fuzziest, sweetest pup can bite if provoked. From nips to bites to actual attacks, dog bites are a serious problem. Dog bite victims requiring medical attention in the US number approximately 800,000 annually. Countless more bites go untreated.

What Can Dog Owners Do?

- Carefully consider your pet selection. Puppies should not be obtained on impulse.
- Make sure your pet is socialized as a young puppy so it feels at ease around people and other animals. *Gradually expose your dog to a variety of situations under controlled circumstances;* continue that exposure on a regular basis as your dog gets older. *Don't put your dog in a position where it feels threatened or teased.*
- Wait until your child is older. Because so many dog bites happen to younger children, it is suggested that parents wait until children are older than four years old.
- Train your dog: The basic commands, such as sit, stay, no and come can be incorporated into fun activities which build a bond of obedience and trust between pets and people. Avoid highly excitable games like wrestling or tug-of-war. Always use a leash in public to control your dog.
- Keep your dog healthy: Have your dog vaccinated against rabies and preventable infectious diseases. Parasite control and other health care is important because how your dog feels directly affects behavior.
- Neuter your pet: It is a fact; neutered dogs are three times less likely to bite.

•Be a responsible pet owner. License your pet as required. Obey leash laws. Dogs are social animals; spending time with your pet is important. Dogs that are frequently left alone have a greater chance of developing behavior problems.

•Be Alert: Know your dog and be alert to signs of illness. Also, watch for signs that your dog is uncomfortable or feeling aggressive and remove your dog from the situation immediately.

Other Helpful Tips:

•*NEVER* leave a baby or small child alone with a dog. Teach young children—including toddlers—to be careful around pets. Children must be taught *not* to approach strange dogs. Teach children to ask an owner's permission before petting a dog.

•Don't run past a dog: dogs naturally love to chase and catch things, don't give them a reason to become excited or aggressive.

•**Never disturb a dog that is caring for puppies, sleeping or eating.**

•If a dog approaches to sniff you, stay still. In most cases, the dog will go away when it determines you are not a threat.

•If you are threatened by a dog, *remain calm*. Don't scream. If you say anything, speak calmly and firmly. Avoid eye contact. Try to stay still until the dog leaves, or back away slowly until the dog is out of sight. *Do not turn and run!*

•If you fall or are knocked to the ground, curl into a ball with your hands over your head and neck. Protect your face.

Dogs are wonderful companions. By acting responsibly, owners not only reduce the number of dog bites but also enhance the relationship they have with their dog.

never taken care of, Sophie would need to have the leg amputated or have a costly cruciate surgery to try to repair the damage to her leg. A number of people expressed surprise that the Humane Society simply didn't put Sophie to sleep because of her injury. Instead, the great staff that works at the Humane Society saw what a wonderful personality Sophie had and decided she deserved a second chance.

Through Charlie's Fund the Humane Society was able to pay for the cruciate surgery that Sophie needed. Charlie's Fund exists through donations by generous people who want to help sick and injured animals that arrive at the shelter and need extra care above what the Humane Society can provide. The staff at Lyons Veterinary Clinic even commented that, even though Sophie was in pain after the surgery, she continued to be the sweet dog that she is. Just a week after having surgery, Sophie is getting around better than expected.



If I ever had any second thoughts about adopting this 65-pound lap dog, all I have to do is look into her light brown eyes and see all the love in them.

and Dad find terribly amusing. She is also the "life of the party" and loves catnip.

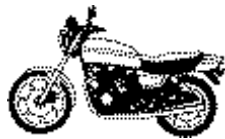

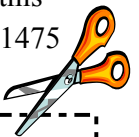
"PAWS FOR A CAUSE" CAMPAIGN

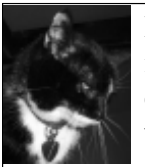
